Bettye: The Brownsville Texas Incident of 1906: The True and Tragic Story of a Black Battalion's Wrongful Disgrace and Ultimate Redemption, Red Engine Press, May 2020. This is the story of racial justice when one committed officer, stationed at the Pentagon in 1972, Major William Baker, reversed President Theodore Roosevelt's decision to discharge without honor 167 soldiers of the First Battalion Twenty-fifth Infantry, falsely accused of shooting up the town of Brownsville, Texas in 1906.
